New SPI Observer Alternate is elected!

We would like to introduce Jiajia Luo from China Green Foundation (China), who will be representing the civil society organizations (CSOs) accredited to the convention. Ms. Luo will act as an alternate of the current CSO observer to the Science-Policy Interface until the end of 2021 and will become the fully-fledged CSO observer for the biennium 2022–2023.



Luo Jiajia (China) joined the China Green Foundation (CGF) in 2012 and now is the deputy director of the Project Management Department and is mainly responsible for collaboration projects with international NGOs in China. Regarding the UNCCD related experience, Ms. Luo attended COP 12 in Ankara, 2015, and CRIC 15 in Nairobi, 2016, representing CGF. As the UNCCD CSO Panel members in 2018-2019, she helped Chinese CSOs got registered with UNCCD, organized the CSO preparatory meeting prior to the COP, and helped publish and distribute daily ECO News during the COP to make sure that CSOs voice is heard.

#Zerofoodwaste CSO Alliance's first global campaign



If it takes chopping down forests about the size of South Korea annually to add the food global population needs, it's debatable. But if food 100 times that amount is wasted after the deforestation each year, something's definitely wrong.

Food, Feed and Fiber is this year's theme for the Desertification and Drought Day. The #zerofoodwaste campaign led by the CSO Alliance, aims to raise awareness on how much food is wasted and how much it contributed to desertification.

Stopping the 1.3 billion tons of annual food waste is huge. Theoretically, it can free up farmland area 100 times the annual deforestation, 23% of all global freshwater use and carbon emission allowance of 32% from manufacturing or 25% from transportations.

The combined efforts of people and governments in the form of policy-making already shows progress, and much work needs to be done.

The Campaign has started on 10 June and will continue until the 17th. It is the first campaign led by CSO Alliance under one unified logo. The campaign has so far successfully demonstrated the potential for the impact the global CSO's can have when focused under one logo. For this Campaign, member CSO's voluntarily contributed by preparing the campaign kit in 13 languages including Korean, Portuguese, Persian, Croatian, Romanian, Russian, Chinese, Spanish, French, English, Thai, Hind and Bengali. The kit uploaded to an open platform and participating CSOs can download their own kit by submitting their logo. Participants are asked to take action by uploading photos of cleared plates and by challenging friends with hashtags #zerofoodwaste #cso_alliance #unccd #dndd.

CSO Alliance plans to continue future endeavors. How much the CSO Alliance can contribution to raising global awareness on the issue of Land Degradation and reaching LDN remains on the hands of participating CSO's.

Antigua and Barbuda: a tale of community development and the right to water

The Barnes Hill Community Development Organization and the Freetown Community Group from Antigua and Barbuda in the Eastern Caribbean which have restored their reservoirs as important water management sites. Five reservoirs built in the 1980's provided daily two buckets of water per family, but there was a lot of fighting in the lines for water was scarce.

Currently, 127 years later the reservoirs have no cracks and all still holding water with only the roofs made of galvanizing sheets rotten. Nevertheless, past innovations not being maintained or continually funded or replicated by current and past Governments. Why were the five reservoirs that were carefully built and engineered in specially chosen locations left in ruins?

So, local actions in restoring the reservoirs that have led to the development of Community Conservation Areas for planting food and fruit trees that support pollinators, saving seeds and leading to the propagation and recovery of local plant species that were previously threatened, endangered, and in extinction contributing to food security and 2

nutrition. Restoring the reservoirs was the community' s response to the ongoing drought which was negatively impacting the personal and community food supply, hygiene, health, and sanitation of families with plants and animals dying.

This tale of two villages securing and protecting their rights to water has led to multiple benefits in the development of community conservation areas supporting Land Degradation Neutrality (LDN), biodiversity and ecosystems protection, food production, nutrition security and livelihoods enhancement all evolving during COVID-19 crisis.

New project launched to protect water resources of Azerbaijan



In recent decades, natural populations of salmon, sturgeon, and other endangered fish species have come to the brink of extinction as a result of human activities. In this regard, a number of crucial initiatives are being implemented in order to protect and restore the aquatic fauna of Azerbaijan and the Caucasus region.

Abundant Basins - a major new project to protect and improve the internal water resources of Azerbaijan was launched at the initiative IDEA founder Leyla Aliyeva.

Conducted by IDEA and Ministry of Ecology and Natural Resources of Azerbaijan, the project oversees scheduled fish stocking events in the rivers and lakes to replenish the country's fish populations, cleanup activities to reduce the water pollution levels and promotion of sustainable fishing to ultimately restore the marine environment. The new project kicked off with the start of the spawning season in the country, during which 10,000 trout fish were released into Nohurgishlag lake in Gabala district on 7 May 2020.
